

QUESTION 4

Shall the Town of Sunderland accept sections 3 to 7, inclusive, of Chapter 44B of the General Laws, as proposed by a petition signed by at least five percent of the registered voters of this town, a summary of which appears below?

SUMMARY

Sections 3 to 7 of Chapter 44B of the General Laws of Massachusetts, also known as the Community Preservation Act ("Act"), establish a dedicated funding source to: acquire, create and preserve open space and land for recreational use; acquire, preserve, rehabilitate and restore historic resources; create, preserve and support community housing; and rehabilitate and restore open space, land for recreational use and community housing that is acquired or created in accordance with the Act. In Sunderland, the Act will be funded, beginning in Fiscal Year 2012, by an additional surcharge of three percent (3%) on the annual tax levy on real property and by matching funds provided by the state. The following exemptions from such surcharge, permitted under Section 3 (e) of said Act, will apply: (1) \$100,000 of the value of each taxable parcel of residential real property; and (2) property owned and occupied as a domicile by a person who would qualify for low income housing or low or moderate income senior housing in the Town. A taxpayer receiving a regular property tax abatement or exemption will also receive a pro rata reduction in surcharge. A Community Preservation Committee must be created pursuant to bylaw and will make recommendations on the use of the funds. Town Meeting must approve any such recommendation before funds can be expended, and at least 10% of the funds for each fiscal year will be spent or reserved for later spending on each of the Act's three community preservation purposes: (1) open space (excluding land for recreational use), (2) historic resources and (3) community housing. All expenditures pursuant to the Act will be subject to an annual audit.

SUMMARY

Sections 3 through 7 of Chapter 44B of the General Laws, also known as the Community Preservation Act (the "Act"), establish a dedicated funding source to enable cities and towns to (1) acquire open space which includes land for park and recreational uses and the protection of public drinking water sources and supplies, watershed land, marshes and wetlands, farm land, fields, forests, beaches, river, stream, lake and pond frontage, scenic areas, wildlife preserves and other conservation areas, (2) acquire and restore historic buildings and sites, and (3) create affordable housing.

In Marlborough, the funding source for these community preservation purposes will be a surcharge of 2% on the annual property tax assessed on all real property commencing in fiscal year 2011. Remedies provided by law for the collection of real estate taxes shall apply to said surcharge. The amount collected through the surcharge will be augmented by annual matching distributions, ranging from 5% to 100%, made by the state to the City of Marlborough from a trust fund created by the Act.

In addition, if approved, the following will be exempt from the surcharge: (1) property owned and occupied as a domicile by any person who would qualify for low income housing or low or moderate income senior housing in Marlborough, as defined in Section 2 of the Act, and (2) one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000.00) of the value of each taxable parcel of residential real property in Marlborough. A taxpayer receiving a regular property tax abatement or exemption will also receive a pro rata reduction in the surcharge.

A Community Preservation Committee will be established by ordinance to study community preservation resources, possibilities, and needs, and to make annual recommendations to the city council on spending the funds. In every fiscal year, at least 30% of the annual funds will be spent, or reserved for later spending, on each of the Act's three preservation purposes as follows: (1) at least 10% for open space (excluding land for recreational purposes), (2) at least 10% for historic resources, and (3) at least 10% for affordable housing. The remaining 70% of the funds may be allocated to any of the three purposes without a percentage restriction, but not more than 5% may be allocated to administrative and operating expenses of the Community Preservation Committee.

Shall the Town of Gosnold accept sections 3 to 7 inclusive, of Chapter 44B of the General Laws, as approved by its legislative body, a summary of which appears below?

SUMMARY

Sections 3 to 7 of Chapter 44B of the General Laws of Massachusetts, also known as the Massachusetts Community Preservation Act, establishes a dedicated funding source to acquire and preserve open space, parks and conservation land, protect public drinking water supplies, and scenic areas, protect farm land and forests from future development, restore and preserve historic properties, and help meet local families' housing needs. In Gosnold, the Massachusetts Community Preservation Act will be funded by an additional excise of 1.5% on the annual tax levy on real property to be assessed beginning in fiscal year 2012, and by matching funds provided by the state. The Town Meeting may also vote to accept one or more of the following exemptions from the surcharge, permitted under §3(e) of said Act: (i) property owned and occupied as a domicile by any person who qualifies for low income housing or low or moderate income senior housing in the Town, as defined in §2 of said Act; (ii) class three, commercial, and class four, industrial, properties as defined in G.L. c.59, §2A; and (iii) \$100,000 of the value of each taxable parcel of residential real property. Any other taxpayer receiving an exemption of real property authorized by Chapter 59 of the General Laws shall be exempt from said Act. A Community Preservation Committee will annually make recommendations on the use of the funds to the Town Meeting.

Shall licenses be granted in this town for the sale of all alcoholic beverages (whiskey, rum, gin, malt beverages, wines and all other alcoholic beverages) to be drunk on the premises of restaurants?

SUMMARY

The Legislature has enacted and the Governor has signed Chapter 330 of the Acts and Resolves of 2010 which would permit the licensing of restaurants in the Town of Pepperell to serve all alcoholic beverages, including distilled spirits, for consumption on the premises. Such licenses would be issued by the Board of Selectmen as licensing authority subject to the approval of the Alcoholic Beverages Control Commission. Currently, licenses for consumption on the premises of alcoholic beverages are limited to wine and malt beverages. A yes vote on this question would allow the issuance to restaurants of licenses for service of all alcoholic beverages for consumption on the premises. A no vote would maintain the current limitations on issuance of licenses to wine and malt beverages only.

Shall sections 1 to 7, inclusive, sections 10 to 13, inclusive, and sections 15 to 25, inclusive, of an act passed by the General Court in the year 2010 entitled 'An Act Relative to the Charter of the City known as the Town of Franklin,' be accepted?

SUMMARY

The proposed changes to the Franklin Charter contained in Sections 1-7, 10-13, and 15-25 of the Home Rule legislation include updates to various provisions to comply with existing law or to reflect current municipal practice; they also include several technical corrections. The major changes are summarized as follows: redefining duties of Town Council Clerk to comply with Open Meeting and Public Records laws, providing the Town Council with the ability to reorganize itself and flexibility in scheduling meetings, clarifying the Town Administrator's authority and duties including his appointing authority, updating the listing of standing committees and appointed positions to eliminate obsolete ones, provision for both a temporary and acting town administrator if the town administrator is absent or the position is vacant, reduction of the finance committee from eleven to nine members and updating of the process for their appointment, updating of annual budget and financial planning processes, elimination of obsolete section governing personnel suspension and removals, and elimination of obsolete transitional provisions in connection with charter's original adoption and prior amendment.
