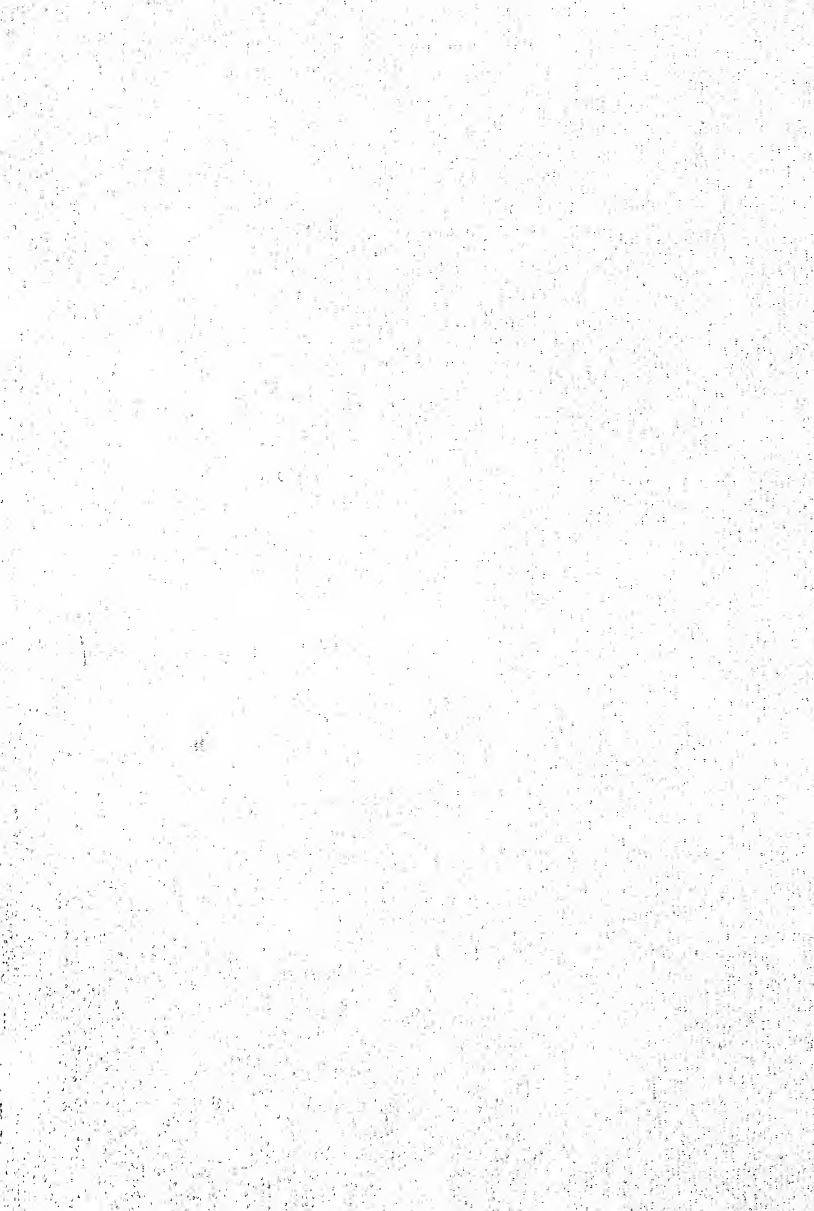

SUMMARY OF ACT TO AMEND CHARTER OF THE CITY OF LOWELL

This proposed law provides for changes in the Charter of the City of Lowell. The Charter would be amended to vest the Chief Executive power of the City of Lowell in a Mayor elected by and from the qualified voters of the City. The Mayor would also have veto power over ordinances, resolutions, orders and votes adopted or passed by the City Council. The Mayor's veto may be overridden by a two-thirds vote of the City Council. If the Mayor does not return a vote, order, resolution or ordinance to the City Council with his/her written objection to it within ten (10) days after it is presented to him/her, it shall take effect. The Mayor would receive the same salary as was paid to the City Manager under the Plan E Charter. If a vacancy occurs in the office of Mayor during the first twelve months of his/her term, the City Council will order a special election to fill the vacancy. If a vacancy occurs in the office of the Mayor during the last twelve months of his/her term, the chairperson of the City Council will perform the duties of Mayor for the remainder of the term, except that s/he would not be able to make permanent appointments to city departments.

The government of the City of Lowell would continue to be vested in nine (9) City Councilors elected at large for two (2) year terms. The City Council member who received the highest number of votes at the general municipal election would

SUMMARY OF ACT AMENDING CHARTER OF THE CITY OF LOWELL TO IMPOSE TERM LIMITATIONS ON ALL CITY OF LOWELL ELECTED PUBLIC OFFICIALS

Under this proposed law, no individual would be able to serve as a member of the School Committee of the City of Lowell, as a member of the City Council of the City of Lowell, or as Mayor elected by the registered voters of the City of Lowell for more than a total of four (4), consecutive or non-consecutive, two (2)-year terms.

If accepted by the voters of the City of Lowell, this proposed law would take effect on the first Monday in January, 1996.

SUMMARY

This proposed law would amend the Charter of the City of Melrose, causing three specific changes to the current election process. (1) The person serving as Mayor of Melrose would become a full member of the School Committee. (2) The total number of School Committee members would be reduced from nine to seven. Six members would be elected and one member would be the Mayor. (3) In the city election of 1995, the six elected members of the School Committee will be those receiving the highest number of votes. The three elected members receiving the most votes in that election shall serve terms of four years. The three elected members receiving the fewest votes shall serve terms of two years. In regular city elections in 1997 (and every two years thereafter), there would be three vacancies on the School Committee caused by the expiration of the terms of its members.

The Chairperson of the City Council would receive the same salary as was paid to the Mayor under the Plan E Charter.

The School Committee would consist of seven (7) members elected at large for two (2) year terms. The School Committee member who received the highest number of votes at the general municipal election would serve as the Chairperson of the School Committee. The member who received the second highest number of votes at the general municipal election would serve as the Vice-Chairperson of the School Committee. The Chairperson of the School Committee would receive the same salary as the other members of the School Committee. The general management and conduct of the public schools of the City of Lowell is vested in the School Committee.

A vacancy in the City Council or School Committee would be filled by whichever of the defeated candidates received the highest number of votes in the last regular municipal election, and is eligible and willing to fill the vacancy.

If accepted by the voters of the City of Lowell, this proposed law would take effect for the October 10, 1995 preliminary election for nominations, the November 7, 1995 regular city elections, and, for all other purposes, on the first Monday in January, 1996.

QUESTION 10

Shall an act passed by the general court in the year nineteen hundred and ninety-four, entitled "An act establishing a board of selectmen-town manager form of administration in the town of Sudbury", be accepted?

SUMMARY

The proposed law is a special act of the legislature applicable to the Town of Sudbury, which would change the form of town administration to a Selectmen-Town Manager form of government. The act transfers a portion of the authority of the Selectmen and other elected officials to the Town Manager, and would change the status of certain elected officials to positions appointed by the Town Manager under the policy direction of the Selectmen.

The Board of Selectmen will be the chief executive officers of the Town, and shall be the chief policy making board of the Town for all subordinate boards and officials. The Selectmen shall appoint a Town Manager, Town Counsel, Town Accountant, and all boards and committees not otherwise provided by law.

The act provides for the appointment of the Town Clerk and Highway Surveyor by the Town Manager and the appointment of Constables by the Board of Selectmen. The administrative functions of the Board of Assessors, including the appointment of a Director of Assessing, and the administration of the departments under elected boards other than Health and School would be placed under the Town Manager.

The financial, personnel and administrative functions of the Town will be vested in the Town Manager as the Chief Administrative Officer of the Town. The Town Manager, appointed at the pleasure of the Board of Selectmen, will appoint all officials and employees of the Town and shall award all contracts for the Town except those of the School or Health Departments.

The legislative powers of the Town shall continue to be exercised by a Town Meeting open to all voters of the Town.
